



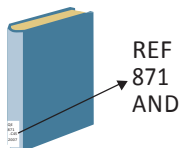
Reading Dewey Decimal Call Numbers

School & Public Libraries

Once you've researched the library's catalog, how do you locate your items in the library? Some catalogs will list the section and floor for each item. It will also list a call number so you can zero in on the correct shelf in the library. Most school and public libraries in the U. S., use the *Dewey Decimal Classification System* to assign call numbers to most library materials, including books and journals.

What is the purpose of call numbers? Each book or journal has a call number, which provides an address or location for the item, and also provides valuable information about it, such as the subject and the first letters of the author's last name.

Call numbers appear:
on the spine of books... and ...in the library catalog



Note that the same call number can be written from top-to-bottom, or left-to-right.

How do you read call numbers? The Dewey Decimal Classification System uses a system of numbers to arrange materials on library shelves by subject:

Read call numbers line by line

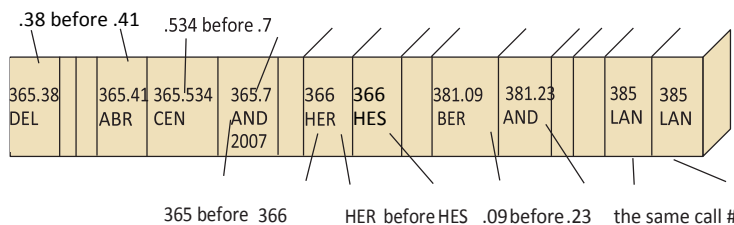
Read the first line-- REF typically means the book is in the Reference section.

Read the second line as a number. Remember to add extra 0's to make the numbers after the decimal the same
301.09; 301.453; 301.5; 301.679
Is like 301.090; 301.453; 301.500; 301.679. These are in correct order.

The third line is the first 3 letters of the author's last name.

The last line is the publication date—not all libraries include this.

In what order do call numbers appear on the shelf? Call numbers are arranged first by the decimal number, and then if identical, with the letters of the authors last name.



What information does the call number tell you? The Dewey Decimal Classification System arranges materials by subjects. The first section of the call number represent the subject of the book. The letters below the decimal number of the call number often represents the author's last name.:



Title: *Glorified Dinosaurs: the origins and early evolution of birds*

Author: Chiappe, Luis M.

Call Number:
568
CHI

The first line describes the subject of the book:
568 = paleozoology - birds

This line often represents the author's last name:
CHI = Chiappe

Why is this important to know? Although the most efficient way to locate materials on a particular topic is usually to perform a subject search in online catalog and then note the call number for each retrieved item, browsing the shelves can also help you locate material appropriate for your topic. Since books are classified by subject, you can often find several helpful books on the same shelf, or nearby. For example, within the subject classification 568, there may be several guides about the evolution of birds.

Dewey Decimal Classification

The Dewey Decimal Classification system is used in libraries to organize knowledge into ten broad categories, 000-900. Each category is subdivided into narrower topics. For example, books about how to play basketball are found in 796.323. 700=arts & recreation; 790=sports, games & entertainment; 796=athletic & outdoor sports & games; 796.3=indoor games; 796.32=ball & net sports; 796.323=basketball
